




2021 The year COVID-19 continued to make children's lives so much harder

On the edge of Nepal's far-western border with India, health worker Birma, carries the hopes of a community on her back.

For years, Birma has been responsible for carrying life-saving vaccines to the remote Pipalchauri health post. Now she treads the same path with COVID-19 vaccines.

A risky journey

It is possible to drive halfway to Duhun in a vehicle, followed by over an hour's walk across a long footbridge and up a steep slope to the health post. But during the monsoon, landslides that often follow heavy rains, render the already narrow, rocky roads impassable for weeks at a time. So Birma prefers to walk – a journey that can take between three to four hours, but, she says, every step is worth it. "This has been a hard time for everyone," she says, "We all want this to be over and to return to normal. I'm glad to be helping in that in my own way."

Thanks to your amazing support, UNICEF teams continue to deliver COVID-19 vaccines every single day in more than 144 countries. Thank you for helping us.

YEMEN Your gifts inspire and save

Intense air bombing forced Amina* and her family out of their home. They now live in a camp for displaced people in Aden where the overcrowded conditions and lack of clean water and safe sanitation make

children like her very vulnerable to water-borne disease and malnutrition.

Your gift of clean water is critical

"UNICEF gave us shelter materials when we arrived," says Amina's father Yahya. "They have also provided the community with health and water services because we were suffering. They fixed everything."



Yahya is so grateful for the help people like you gave the family when they arrived that he now volunteers with UNICEF as a community outreach worker. Since the arrival of COVID-19, he has been teaching camp residents about the importance of handwashing and physical distancing.

Thanks to help like yours, in Yemen, a total of 2.4 million people now benefit daily from the provision of safe water supply.

Two-year-old Fatima has her nutritional status screened using a MUAC tape at a health clinic supported by UNICEF. Your donations are helping to provide immunisation, health, and nutrition services for children struggling in appalling conditions.

What is happening in Afghanistan right now is one of the worst crises in living memory. Many of our colleagues are shocked by the speed and the scale of this emergency – and winter makes is so much worse. The bitter weather has already set in and it's extremely cold. Temperatures can reach as low as -12°C and impoverished families are struggling to heat their homes and keep their children warm.

UNICEF is there – thanks to you

Millions of children urgently need vital services, including vaccines and medicines, ready-to-use therapeutic food, blankets to keep warm, and school supplies like backpacks and jotters. There's a drought so families need water which – thanks to your help – we're trucking to the most in-need communities, and we're also bringing fuel to schools so that children stay cosy while they learn.

VOICES FROM THE FIELD

Can you tell us the latest malnutrition situation for children?

It's dire. Over half the population, around 23 million people, is food insecure; 13 million are children. That means they don't have access to affordable or nutritious food. UNICEF has warned that 3.2 million children are acutely malnourished, and over 1 million children are at risk of dying from severe acute malnutrition within weeks unless they can get life-saving treatment.

How is COVID-19 affecting Afghanistan?

COVID-19 is one of many challenges facing the people of Afghanistan right now.

Since April 2020, the total number of COVID-19 cases is 160,000, with 7,313 deaths. We suspect the real numbers are much higher but the data is patchy because of the compromised health system. UNICEF is working hard to get vaccines into the arms of the most vulnerable as fast as possible. In October, we supported the vaccination of over one million adults to protect them and their communities.

Are the winters in Afghanistan very harsh?

I met families in Bamyan, in the central highlands, recently, who had no money to buy wood and were drying animal manure to use as fuel for cooking and to warm their homes. In the height of winter, snow falls and extreme cold can make reaching the children that need us most, in remote and mountainous areas, very challenging. That's why, every year we're in a race against time to get vital supplies into the most rural areas before snow cuts them off.

How does support from UNICEF donors in Ireland help children there?

We simply couldn't do our work without the generous support of donors, big and small; we are incredibly grateful to the people of Ireland. Each donation helps the most disadvantaged children not just survive but thrive.

When crises hit in places that haven't been able to vaccinate their populations quickly enough like India, the COVID-19 pandemic can turn an existing oxygen gap into a crisis. Your gifts enabled UNICEF teams to develop an innovative emergency solution – the Oxygen Plantin-a-Box package. It includes everything needed to produce large volumes of medical grade oxygen and can be operational within days of arriving.

Each plant has the capacity to produce up to 720,000 litres of oxygen per day, capable of supplying the oxygen needs of about 50-60 COVID-19 patients round the clock or more than 100 children with severe pneumonia.

Five-year-old Ithraa, and her sister, Farah, 18 months, who live in rural Damascus are very impressed with the warm winter clothes they've just received from UNICEF - thanks to a donation like yours.

In Syria, more than a decade of conflict and economic hardship mean that many families are barely able to stay afloat, let alone buy their children warm clothes or obtain fuel to fend off the cold.

The winter clothing kits you help to deliver are sourced locally with supplies reaching children sooner and less is spent on transport. This injects much-needed cash into the local economy, making communities much more resilient over the long term.

During the past winter season, you helped UNICEF to support thousands of children inside Syria. Thanks to you they got warm clothing, blankets, food, water and hygiene supplies.

You're helping children to weather the storm

Peterson was only four years old when he lost part of his arm in the 2010 earthquake. In August last year, another devastating quake took his home.

The 7.2 magnitude earthquake killed over 2,200 people and injured more than 12,700. The powerful quake collapsed homes, hospitals and schools, leaving an estimated 1.2 million people, including 540,000 children, in urgent need of assistance.

UNICEF is there to care – thanks to you

Peterson is among 178 children who are now

receiving care at a centre supported by your donations. "We have lessons, play, and they give us meals," Peterson explains.

The centre, like many others UNICEF supports, provides more than lessons. It also protects children from the risks of exploitation and trafficking, which surge for children uprooted by natural disaster.
