You're a life saver for children

GAZA

Every day, 11-year-old Salam risks her life braving the bombardments to collect the drinking water her family cannot survive without. The situation facing families like hers in the Gaza Strip is now beyond dire. In a region that has long suffered severe problems, water and sanitation services have reached the point of collapse with largescale disease outbreaks looming. So far, you have helped us reach tens of thousands of children like Salam with life-saving water, as well as food, medicines and blankets. UNICEF has been supporting Palestinian children in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip since the early 1980s, and, thanks to you, we're still there today helping children in what is now the most dangerous place on earth to be a child.

Voices from the field

At the end of last year, UNICEF spokesperson James Elder spent almost two weeks in Gaza. Amidst the horrors he witnessed, he also saw the phenomenal power of your donations to save children's lives against all the odds. What follows here is his first-hand account.



It breaks my heart to see the desperate suffering of children in Gaza. Thousands and thousands of boys and girls have been killed and the terrifying bombardments are merciless. Over a million people are being pushed to the south with nowhere to go, no food, no water, no sanitation, no medicine. The situation is absolutely dire.

In all my years with UNICEF and the crises I have been to, I have never witnessed anything as bad as this. Hospitals are on life support with heroic health workers often operating without

light because there's no fuel and without anaesthetic because there are no medicines. But I am so full of admiration for how they carry on trying to do everything they can to help children despite the inhumane and terrible conditions.

Amid all this horror, UNICEF continues to respond. I was on missions taking the exact things people in Gaza say they urgently need. Life-saving food, water and medicine. Going from south to north, to hospitals, to communities. We will continue to be on the frontlines for these children, getting vital aid to those who need it – thanks of course to your wonderfully generous support that we are so very grateful to you for.

TURKEY

As Sidra navigates life after the loss of her father and sister, her grandfather, Hassan, has been her pillar of strength and support.

You're healing the trauma of crisis

Almost a year after multiple earthquakes devastated parts of Turkey, 10-year-old Sidra still struggles to sleep at night. Sidra and her mother, Sernaz, were trapped beneath the rubble of their home for 18 hours. When they were eventually rescued, Sidra heard the terrible news that her father and older sister had both been killed. Long after a crisis is over, children continue to suffer the traumatic after-effects, which is why UNICEF does not leave. With your help, we have reached over a million children and caregivers with mental health and psychosocial support through 47 child, adolescent and family support hubs.

1.2 million children and caregivers have been given professional psychosocial support

3.9 million people have been given access to clean water, keeping them safe from disease

Over 98,000 people have been reached with warming heaters, blankets and winter clothes

SYRIA

You're giving protection from the cold

Radwan, 9, and his sister, Rimas, 5, have lovely warm clothes thanks to the cash transfer their mother, Maysaa, received from UNICEF with your help. Like millions of families in Syria, they were forced from their home by conflict and spent years in temporary shelters. When the earthquakes hit northern Syria in February of last year, your kind donations helped to support displaced families like theirs through the harsh winter by providing them with money to spend on fuel for heating, gas for cooking, and warm clothes and blankets to protect their children from the bitter conditions.

You're giving life-saving water

At just nine years old, Wala has one of the most important jobs. Every morning before school she collects water for her family. In Sudan, over 17 million people lack access to a safe drinking water supply and are at risk of disease. Every time Wala brings water home to her family she knows she could be putting them in danger. But thanks to you, families like hers now have water purification tablets that help them to ensure their water is safe to drink. Since April last year when civil war erupted in Sudan, you've helped us to deliver vital water treatment chemicals to clean drinking water for thousands of people. You have saved lives in what is now a dire humanitarian crisis.

Your support is a lifeline after crisis

Months after Storm Daniel unleashed havoc across eastern Libya, bursting dams and destroying homes, hospitals and schools, UNICEF is still there helping children and communities to pick up the pieces of their shattered lives. With your support, we're helping to restore basic services such as essential child nutrition and screening programmes. We've helped to reopen schools and set up temporary classrooms in the most badly damaged areas. We're working with the authorities to get primary healthcare services back up and running, and we're establishing safe water points, including two water treatment plants providing safe water to 10,000 residents in Derna – the most badly affected city.




