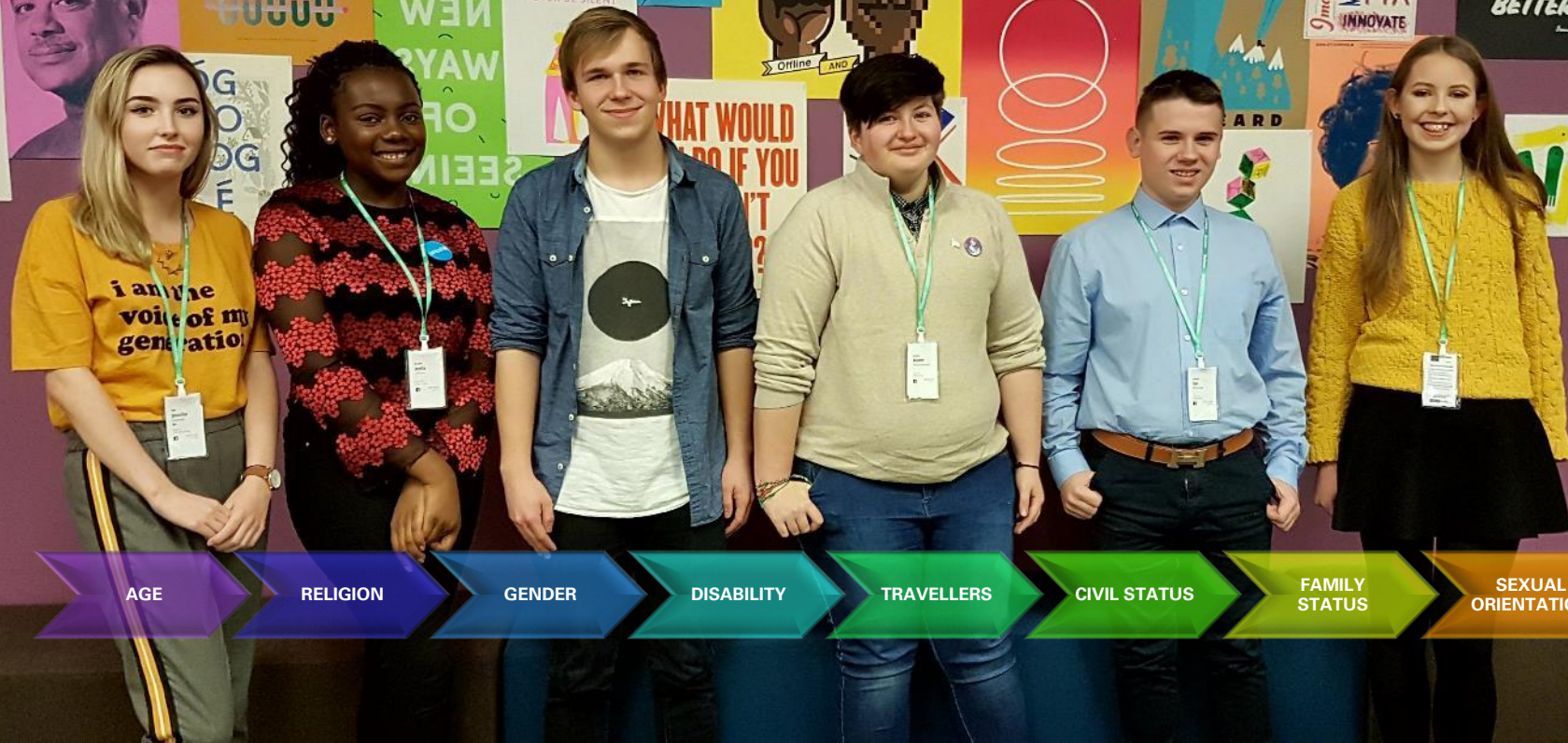

DEFINITIONS TO UNDERSTAND

Discrimination

Unjust or prejudicial treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of race, age, or sex.

Racism

Prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism directed against someone of a different race based on the belief that one's own race is superior.

Bigotry

Intolerant devotion to one's own opinions and prejudices.

Prejudice

Preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience.


Xenophobia

Dislike of or prejudice against people from other countries.

DISCRIMINATION

IN SCHOOL

LISTEN & EDUCATE

- **Invite speakers** into your school to share their perspective and experience of discrimination
- **Pay attention** to the voices of people discrimination in your school or community.
- **Learn** about the historical context, how discrimination impacts on specific groups
- **Find out** what policies your school has in place to tackle discrimination and promote inclusion.
- **Survey** experiences in school, find out the extent of the issue.

RAISE AWARENESS

- **Highlight the issues** by using these resources or through activities like art, drama, posters & social media
- **Celebrate** rights, diversity and inclusion by organising inclusion or rights weeks
- **Be vocal** and hold a school assembly on children's rights, inclusion, diversity, anti-racism
- **Be inspired** by sharing stories of activists who have fought discrimination.
- **Campaign** to encourage safe challenging and reporting of incidences.

CHALLENGE & REPORT

- **Develop a rights based charter** for the school or classroom
- **Be an ally** by challenging all forms of discrimination and encourage others to do the same. Make sure you feel safe to do so, otherwise report it.
- **Report incidences** and ensure others do the same. Make sure people know what to do and how to report.
- **Challenge attitudes** run an online campaign challenging stereotypes, jokes and insensitive comments.

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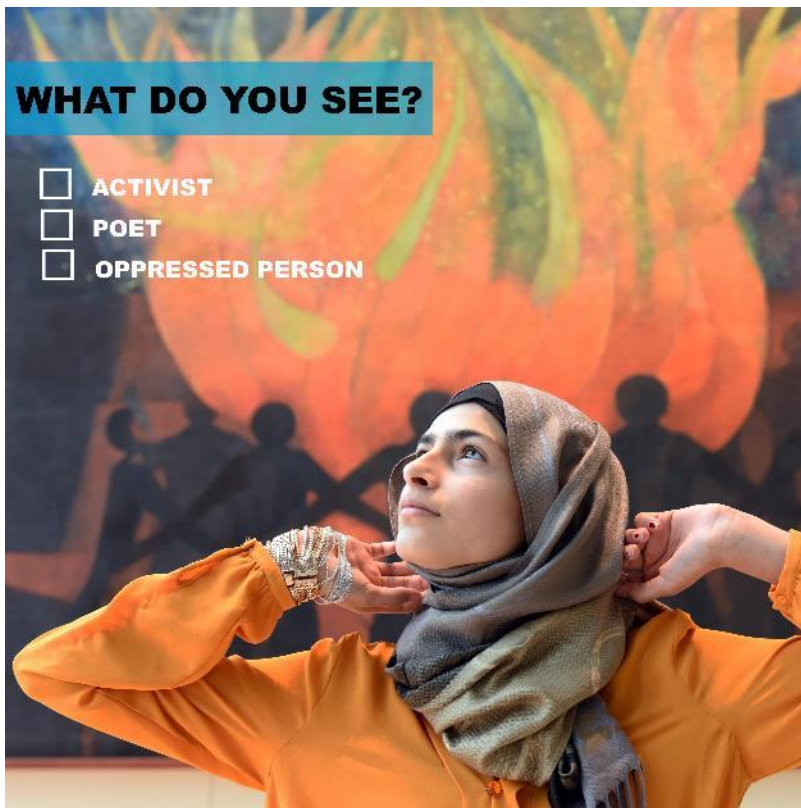
